REPORTS/REQUESTS OF THE BOARD

Recognition of Emergency Medical Services Personnel

County Manager Hughes addressed the Board. The County knows that we have top notch Paramedics in Emergency Services but it is nice when their hard work and dedication is also recognized by other entities. Today Amy Craver, from Wake Forest Baptist Hospital, and Jennifer Underwood, from Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center, are here to present an award to Emergency Services on behalf of the American Heart Association. Amy Craver and Jennifer Underwood addressed the Board. They are pleased to be here to present Yadkin County EMS with the American Heart Association Mission Lifeline Silver Plus Award. This award is presented to agencies who provide excellent care for patients who are experiencing severe heart attacks. Silver Plus is the highest designation a first year recipient can receive and Yadkin County EMS has achieved that honor. Over the years Yadkin County EMS has provided excellent care to their patients and their efforts and dedication have continued to progress each year through training, good leadership, and state of the art equipment. It is an honor and a privilege to work alongside Yadkin County EMS to better the lives of the residents in the communities they serve. They presented Keith Vestal and Chris Bolden with the American Heart Association Mission Lifeline Silver Plus Award in recognition of the outstanding care that Yadkin County EMS provided to cardiovascular patients. Chris Bolden addressed the Board. He wanted to personally congratulate all of the EMS staff. It took a lot of work over the years to get to this point. Yadkin County EMS has always provided a really great service so they just needed to do some work to tie up a few loose ends to be able to meet all the criteria that was needed for Yadkin County EMS to achieve this recognition. He wanted to give a shout out to all of the employees. They did a great job and they are the ones who really deserve this recognition. Keith Vestal addressed the Board. The Yadkin

County EMS staff did great work and Chris Bolden took this project and ran with it and helped bring it to the level it is at now.

Human Services Update

Kim Harrell addressed the Board. The FNS waiver has now been approved for North Carolina for July and August so the recertifications for those months will roll forward. By the time the waiver was approved some of the recertification notices for July had gone out so Human Services has seen a little bit of an increase in foot traffic in the office. The Medicaid recertification work has begun for the cases that are due in September. The Cycle 2 Medicaid audits will begin on August 20th. Yadkin County is in Cycle 3 so our audit won't begin until February or March of 2021. Foster parents were to receive an additional \$100.00 per month/per child in COVID-19 supplemental funding for April, May, and June. The payments for all three months have been completed. Staff has heard that there may be some supplemental funding for July also but they have not received any official notification of that at this time. Human Services is looking at doing some eligibility restructuring. A worker is currently needed to help support an eligibility supervisor that is supervising 16 employees. That supervisor is currently supervising more employees than usual due to a supervisor retiring on July 1st. Kim Harrell has been doing some research and speaking with other Directors to get some ideas around restructuring. Yadkin County's caseloads are about twice the size of the caseloads that many of our peer counties have. There are 88 children in foster care. Medicaid testing for the single county audit will be on August 24th through August 26th. During the day on Friday, Yadkin County had 489 positive COVID-19 cases. As of this morning, Yadkin County has 509 positive cases. Staff is continuing to do contact tracing and, on average, they are monitoring approximately 30 to 35 active cases. Most of the Yadkin County residents who have had COVID-19 have recovered but there have been 6 deaths. The School Nurses have been assisting the County with contact tracing since the beginning of June but this will be their last week here because they need to start preparing for the start of School. Jessica Wall has met with Dr. Martin in preparation for the start of School. Human Services has requested a case investigator from the State. The County has already been provided with a contact tracer, free of charge. The proposed contact case investigator would provide services for Yadkin County, Davie County, and Wilkes County. WIC has distributed approximately 545 ApSeed tablets since the program started last December. The program is doing well. WIC numbers continue to be strong. The caseload for June was 1,087. Environmental Health held a ServSafe class on July 20th and 21st.

The Budget Amendment accepts the funds and places them in a Special Revenue Fund. The Board approved the budget amendment as requested.

Pioneer Shredding Services Contract

Pioneer Shredding Services provides several County Departments with monthly shredding services. The general services contract before the Board today is needed to cover mass shredding services that may come up that fall outside of the normal monthly scheduled shredding services. The Board approved the general services contract and authorized the County Manager to sign it.

Smart Start Contract

The Yadkin County Human Services Agency will provide Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC) services for children enrolled in Smart Start. The Child Care Health Consultant model promotes healthy and safe environments for children in child care settings through consultation, training, and technical assistance services. The Board approved the contract and authorized the County Manager to sign it.

Richmond Hill Law School Commission Non-Profit Grant Agreement

The non-profit grant agreement with the Richmond Hill Law School Commission specifies the requirements they have to meet to receive the funding Yadkin County has budgeted for them. The Board approved the grant agreement and authorized the County Manager to sign it.

Set Public Hearing to Consider Rezoning PIN# 485700310516 & PIN# 485700228168 from HB to RA

Dawn Vallieres addressed the Board. Lester Carl Phillips submitted an application to rezone PIN# 485700310516 & PIN# 485700228168 to Rural Agricultural (RA). The property had a greenhouse on it and is currently zoned as Highway Business (HB). The Planning Board heard the request and voted 5/0 to recommend the rezoning. **Commissioner Welborn made a motion to set a Public Hearing for August 17, 2020 at 7:00pm to consider rezoning PIN# 485700310516 & PIN# 485700228168 from Highway Business (HB) to Rural Agricultural (RA). Commissioner Hemric second.**

BOARD ACTION

Resolution Honoring William Rex Baity

County Manager Hughes addressed the Board. Rex Baity has served the County in many different ways over the last 42 years. Most recently, he has been serving on the Board of Education. Back in the spring he decided to not seek re-election so his term on the Board of Education ends today. The Board of Education

has requested that the Board of Commissioners declare today as William Rex Baity Day. County Manager Hughes read the following Resolution:

**RESOLUTION OF THE YADKIN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, DECLARING
AUGUST 3, 2020 AS WILLIAM REX BAITY DAY**

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity was one of the first Emergency Medical Services employees when it was formed in 1978 and from where he retired 30 years later in 2008; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity was a member of the North Carolina EMS Administrators' Association promoting the association; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity served as the Paramedic Program Coordinator for three Paramedic Classes at Surry Community College; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity is a Lifetime Member of the Yadkin County Rescue Squad, having been an active member 1979-2001 and serving several years as Secretary; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity served the Yadkin County Sheriff's Office as a Reserved Deputy Sheriff; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity served as a Part-time Patrol Officer with the Town of Boonville and ultimately as the Police Chief; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity was elected to serve on the Yadkin County Board of Education in 2000 and having served 20 years through August 3, 2020; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity has been a strong advocate for the safety and well-being of Yadkin County citizens; and

WHEREAS, William Rex Baity has been a strong advocate for the education of Yadkin County students; and

WHEREAS, this County Board of Commissioners appreciates the many ways William Rex Baity has served our county over the last forty-two (42) years.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Yadkin County Board of Commissioners hereby declares Monday, August 3, 2020 as William Rex Baity Day.

Adopted, this the 3rd day of August, 2020.

Commissioner Zachary made a motion to adopt the Resolution of the Yadkin County Board of Commissioners Declaring August 3, 2020 as William Rex Baity Day. Commissioner Welborn second. Vote: 4/0.

Commissioner Zachary had to step out of the meeting so the Sales Tax Referendum agenda item was moved to be the last item in Board Action.

Central Permitting Policy Regarding Refunds of Permit Fees

County Manager Hughes addressed the Board. The Board had previously adopted an Environmental Services Policy Regarding Refunds of Permit Fees. The Policy applies to building permits and Environmental Health permits. A few revisions have been made to the Policy. County Manager Hughes went over the changes. The name of the department has changed to Central Permitting so Environmental Services has been changed to Central Permitting. The second bullet point previously only pertained to Environmental Health Improvement application fees. Human Services requested that be changed to include Repair application fees. The revised bullet point states that Environmental Health Repair and Improvement application fees may be refunded 70% prior to any field work being completed. The policy effective date will be changed to state that this policy revision is effective August 3, 2020. **Commissioner Hemric made a motion to approve the revised Central Permitting Refund Policy. Commissioner Welborn second. Vote: 3/0.**

Budget Amendment to Carry FY20 Funding Forward to FY21

County Manager Hughes addressed the Board. When the fiscal year ends on June 30th, any funds that weren't spent roll into Fund Balance. There were some unspent funds in FY2020 that Departments have requested be carried forward into FY2021 for expenditure. Human Services receives Adoption Incentive funding and the receipt of those funds includes a stipulation that they cannot be used for any other purpose. They requested the unspent Adoption Incentive Funds be appropriated for expenditure in FY2021. The Sheriff's Office sold some guns in FY2020 and they were not able to spend those funds before the end of the fiscal year. They requested the funds be appropriated for expenditure in FY2021. The Animal Shelter and Parks & Recreation received donated funds that they were not able to spend in FY2020. Since those funds were donated specifically to them, they requested the funds be appropriated for expenditure in FY2021. There were funds designated for Agricultural Building expenses that weren't spent in FY2020. Finance requested those funds be appropriated for expenditure in FY2021. Similar requests to carry forward funding are made each year.

Commissioner Zachary returned to the meeting.

Resolution to Request Sales Tax Referendum be Placed on Ballot

County Manager Hughes addressed the Board. Every year the County budgets get tighter and tighter. There are a few things that could be done to increase revenue. The fees the County charges could be increased. That would impact the people who use the services the most. The property tax rate could be increased. That would impact all of the property owners. The Board can request a Sales Tax Referendum be placed on the ballot and, if the citizens vote in favor of the Referendum, it will increase the sales tax by a quarter cent (1/4 cent or \$0.0025). If sales taxes were increased in Yadkin County it would generate approximately \$580,000.00 of revenue. The property tax rate would need to be increased by approximately 2 cents to generate that much revenue. The sales tax increase would not apply to unprepared food or prescription medications. Sales tax is typically considered the fairest tax because it impacts everyone equally. Property owners, non-property owners, and visitors to Yadkin County all pay sales tax whenever they purchase something in Yadkin County. Raising the sales tax would generate the most revenue with the least impact on the County's citizens. Public Safety and Education are critical needs and the cost of providing these services continues to increase. The proceeds generated from the increased sales tax would be shared between the Sheriff's Office, the Fire and Rescue Departments, and Special School Capital Projects. The Sheriff's Office would receive 40% of the proceeds. The Fire Departments and the Rescue Squad would share 40% of the proceeds. The Fire Departments funding would be distributed monthly. The funding each Fire Department would receive would be based upon the road miles within their 6 mile response district. The remaining 20% of the proceeds would be set aside as Committed Fund Balance for future Special Capital Projects that the Yadkin County School System needs. Additional funding for the Sheriff's Office, the Fire Departments, the Rescue Squad, and the School System would benefit all of the citizens throughout the County and it would benefit the municipalities. Citizens who go to Forsyth County and/or Surry County to shop are already paying the quarter cent sales tax that County Manager Hughes is recommending for Yadkin County. To start the process the Board of Commissioners will need to adopt a Resolution to ask the Board of Elections to conduct the Sales Tax Referendum. If the Referendum is approved by the voters, the Board can levy the tax after a 10 day public notice. The earliest the sales tax increase would become effective is April 1, 2021. If

the voters don't approve the Referendum, the sales tax cannot be increased and the Board of Commissioners has to wait at least a year before they can ask the Board of Elections to conduct another Sales Tax Referendum. County Manager Hughes read the Resolution below:

**RESOLUTION OF THE YADKIN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
PLACING A SALES TAX REFERENDUM ON THE BALLOT**

WHEREAS, in 2007, legislation passed by the N.C. General Assembly (Session Law 2007-323) gave counties a local-option one-quarter percent (0.25%) county sales and use tax (N.C.G.S. 105-535); in addition to all other State and local sales and use taxes; and

WHEREAS, the local-option one-quarter percent (0.25%) county sales and use tax is contingent on an advisory referendum being placed on a ballot and receiving approval from the voters of Yadkin County; and

WHEREAS, the Yadkin County Board of Commissioners is hereby requesting the Yadkin County Board of Elections to conduct the required advisory referendum on the question of whether to levy such a local sales and use tax in Yadkin County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Yadkin County Board of Commissioners that:

- (1) A copy of the signed Resolution shall be promptly delivered to the Yadkin County Board of Elections.
- (2) The Yadkin County Board of Elections is requested to publish legal notice of a Tuesday, November 3, 2020 countywide special election not less than 45 days prior to the County General Election on November 3, 2020 in accordance with NC General Statute 163-287 and NC General Statute 105-537.
- (3) The following ballot question shall be placed on the ballot for the Tuesday, November 3, 2020 Municipal Elections and the November 3, 2020 countywide special election in accordance with NC General Statute 163-287:

" FOR AGAINST

Local sales and use tax at the rate of one-quarter percent (0.25%) in addition to all other State and local sales and use taxes."

Adopted this 3rd day of August, 2020.

Commissioner Welborn made a motion to adopt the Resolution of the Yadkin County Board of Commissioners Placing a Sales Tax Referendum on the Ballot. Commissioner Zachary second. Vote: 4/0.

Dorsett Contract

The air conditioning units in the 911 Communications Center server room are not working. The County has a lot of very expensive equipment there that is sensitive to heat so the units need to be replaced as quickly as possible. Two different quotes were obtained and Dorsett was the lowest bidder. A \$9,885.00 contract for Dorsett to replace the units is currently going through the contract control form review process. County Manager Hughes requested the Board authorize her to sign the contract. **Commissioner Hemric made a motion to authorize the County Manager to sign a contract with Dorsett to replace the air conditioning units in the 911 Communications Center. Commissioner Welborn second.**

Coin Shortage

The coin shortage is impacting Yadkin County. The bank is limiting the number of coins that the County can receive from them. The County is going to put up signs asking people to pay with a debit/credit card or have exact change. If the coin shortage continues for very long there may come a point that the County will have to start rounding up or down to the nearest dollar when people pay with cash. Hopefully, the County won't have to resort to rounding.

Commissioner Zachary made a motion rescind Hope Elisa Bryant's appointment to serve on the Partners Behavioral Health Management's Consumer & Family Advisory Committee and appoint her to serve on the Partners Behavioral Health Management Board of Directors, effective July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2023. Commissioner Welborn second.




Commissioner Zachary had to leave at the end of Closed Session.
