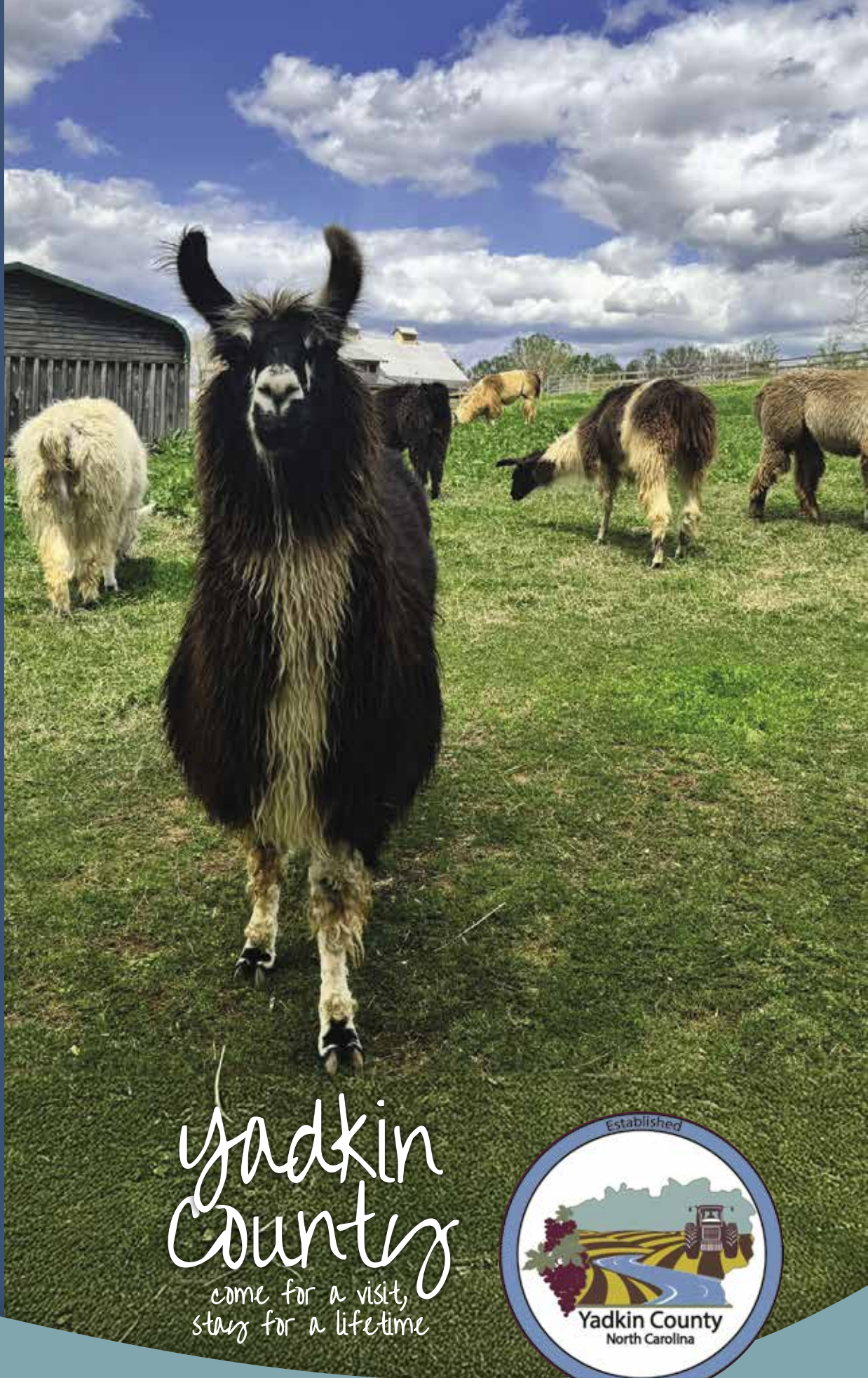

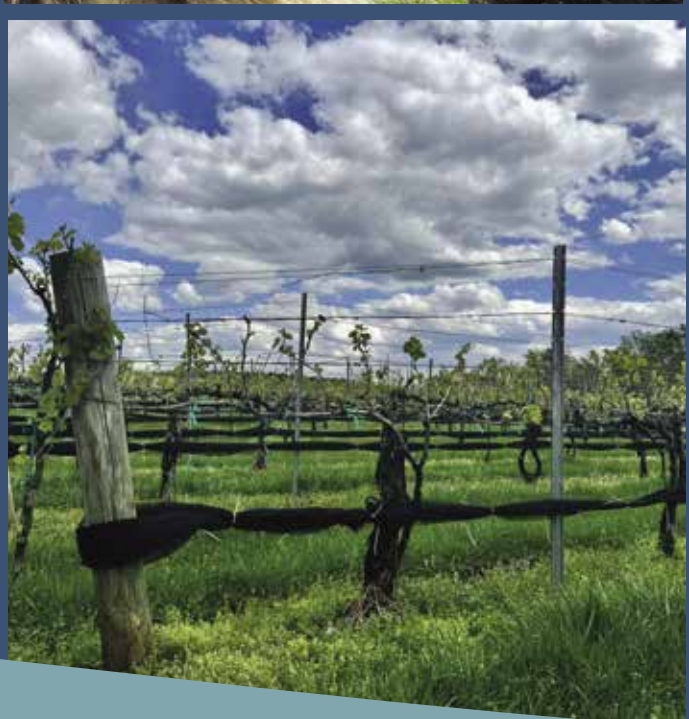
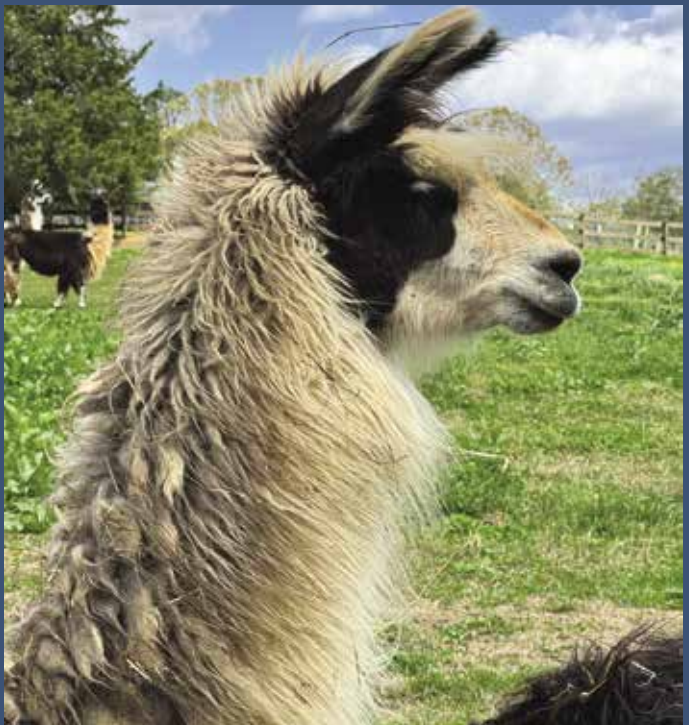

We are very proud of our dedicated employees who have remained committed and available to serve the citizens in Yadkin County. **All are welcome to attend our Board meetings held twice monthly**, the first Monday at 9 a.m. and the third Monday at 7 p.m.

During FY2024, the **COUNTY ADMINISTRATION** implemented a pay classification and pay study for employees to maintain a competitive market rate for new and current employees.

A priority was also placed on properties, with the renovation of the EMS Outpost in Hamptonville and construction beginning on the EMS Outpost in Jonesville and the new Government Building on Elm Street.

The new building will allow citizens to visit the Tax Office and the License Plate Agency without having to go through a metal detector and is made possible due to revenue loss generated Federal ARPA funds. Both the new Jonesville Outpost and the new Government Building will be completed in FY2025.

The County Manager is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the government. The Manager has a variety of responsibilities including implementing and enforcing policies and goals adopted by the Board of Commissioners, administration of county departments and the preparation of the recommended annual budget.

We have been open for over 9 years now in the **YADKIN COUNTY AGRICULTURAL & EDUCATIONAL BUILDING**. This facility offers additional classrooms and labs on the lower level of Surry Community College. The upper level provides office space for the NC Cooperative Extension, the Yadkin Soil and Water Conservation District, the NRCS, the USDA Farm Services Agency and the NC Forest Service. The upper level also offers two banquet rooms that can be combined into one large Banquet Hall and a commercial Kitchen, all available to rent for private and public functions.

In 2017, Yadkin County launched the **Yadkin County Business Development Kitchen (YCBDK)**, located in the Yadkin County Agricultural & Educational Building. This is a shared commercial kitchen that is inspected and licensed by the County's Environmental Health department. This space can be utilized by individuals or groups who want to start a food-related business without investing upfront capital.

The Banquet Hall is a perfect location for meetings, parties and weddings. Rental includes a podium, audio/visual equipment, wireless microphones and a sound system available for use. We provide 72-inch round and oblong tables with chairs at no additional cost.

The YCBDK is also available for rent. Kitchen rental includes prep areas, refrigerator, dishwasher, freezer, coolers, stove, ovens, coffee makers, icemaker, china and utensils.

The **YADKIN COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER** has three full time and two part time employees. Our facility includes **21 double sided dog kennels**, **3 outside dog kennels**, **31 cat kennels**, and an adoptable **cat room called the “Catty Shack”**, that houses up to 12 cats. We strive to ensure that all animals that end up in our care (most at no fault of their own) receive the best possible care, and if not reclaimed by their owner, are adopted or sent to a rescue, where they find their forever homes. Our goal is to give every animal a chance, while many are adoption-ready immediately, some need to be sent to a rescue for rehabilitation, and are adopted, when ready. We are proud to report that, there hasn't been an animal euthanized at our shelter for time / space reasons in over 7 years!

For FY2024 the Yadkin County Animal Shelter had a total of **718 animals** that were adopted, rescued or returned to their owner. The Shelter had 18 people who volunteered for a total of 740 hours. Our volunteers are vital to our success and assist in many different areas including, socializing animals, walking dogs, grooming, washing dishes/laundry and many other tasks throughout the Shelter. Our Community Spay/Neuter Program assisted in altering **95 dogs/cats** this year. Shelter staff administered a total of **867 Rabies vaccines**. Check out and like our Facebook pages “Yadkin County Animal Shelter” and “Yadkin County Lost and Found Pets”.

CENTRAL PERMITTING

YADKIN COUNTY CENTRAL PERMITTING is comprised of:

Building Permitting & Inspections | **Planning & Zoning** | **Environmental Health**

The department administers and enforces all North Carolina state building codes, Environmental Health rules and other Yadkin County ordinances. Central Permitting issues permits for multiple types of development activities such as new construction or remodeling, septic & wells, food & lodging, zoning, mechanical, electrical, plumbing, pools, etc. After permits are issued, follow up inspections are made as required to ensure compliance. Issues that are found not in compliance are noted and staff works with permit holders to correct.



Planning & Zoning focuses both on current planning and long-range planning. Current planning focuses on ordinance compliance and maintenance, while long-range planning looks into Yadkin County's future endeavors.

Yadkin County Central Permitting strives to stay up to date with technology to speed up the permitting process but still maintains the hands-on approach to customer service to assist citizens through the process. FAQS

Do I have to get a permit? You need to get a permit when you build a structure with any dimension 12' or larger.

Why do I need a zoning permit?

To ensure compliance with the zoning ordinance or to ensure the use is permitted in that specific zoning category. If the property is located in the town limits or ETJ (extra territorial jurisdiction), the zoning permit must be issued from the appropriate Town Hall before applying for a building permit.

Do I need a permit for a metal carport?

Detached portable lightweight carports open on sides and not exceeding 400 square feet do not require a building permit. All others will require engineered drawings.

The **COUNTY ATTORNEY** is appointed by the Commissioners to advise the Board, County Manager and Department Directors on legal matters related to the operation of County government. Mr. Powell is responsible for ensuring the affairs and actions of Yadkin County are conducted in accordance with Federal, State and local laws. Opinions are provided on all laws, contracts, leases, resolutions and other legal documents.

Mr. Powell graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Wake Forest School of Law. He is also a U.S. Army Veteran and was awarded the Bronze Star Medal. Mr. Powell's office is located in Winston-Salem, NC.

YADKIN COUNTY EMERGENCY SERVICES is responsible for the coordination and delivery of services during the majority of the emergency situations that occur in our county.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS)

The **EMS Division** had a busy but productive year. We have received the **American Heart Association Mission Lifeline Gold award** for care given in

heart related events. This is the fourth year in a row that we have received this prestigious award. We have been called for Emergency Medical Assistance a total of **6,342 times** this year with an average overall response time of 10 minutes and 47 seconds. We are also able to transport our patients to an Emergency Department in an average of 25 minutes and 10 seconds. That is a very impressive time since those patients are transported to an ED outside of Yadkin County. Another point of interest is the amount of training that our Paramedics receive each year. This year 4,386 hours were spent in a classroom or clinical setting preparing for emergencies. Along with this training we are processing and implementing a pre-hospital blood program. If you are in a condition that requires a blood transfusion Yadkin County Emergency Services EMS Division will be able to provide that care in the field and on the way to the hospital. Currently there are only 15 services in North Carolina that are able to deliver pre-hospital blood.

FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE

The **Fire Marshal's Office** consists of the Fire Marshal, Deputy Fire Marshal, and Part-time Fire Inspectors. This year has been an exceptionally busy time for this division. One of the most notable ways this office impacts safety is by performing fire safety inspections. In doing so, they ensure that every business complies and is safe for the general public. During this reporting period the Fire Marshals and Inspectors completed 846 inspections. They responded to and investigated 42 fires and did 26 public education programs where 238 people received fire extinguisher training. This was possible with grant funding that purchased the fire extinguisher training system. The Fire Marshal's Office produced and distributed a monthly safety newsletter and assisted with 2 Fire Department ISO inspections from the Office of the State Fire Marshal.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Emergency Management works in the background mainly producing plans that are activated in the event of a natural or man-made disaster. One of these plans is the Yadkin County Emergency Operations Plan. This year the number of Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activations was low, with only a few for minor storms. The other major plan that is produced on a five-year rotation is the Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. This plan is in the works of a rewrite and needs information from the citizens of Yadkin County.

Another part of what the EM division does is grant-writing to secure funds to better prepare our county for disasters. This year we were able to secure \$164,960 in funding for many needed projects.

PUBLIC HEALTH PREPAREDNESS & RESPONSE (PHP&R)

Our **Public Health Preparedness & Response** program is a Federal/State funded program that assures Yadkin Country is prepared to respond to disasters. These disasters would be: disease epidemic/pandemic, chemical and radiological incidents, severe weather and other natural or man-made disasters that could impact public health. The PHP&R program is also responsible for assuring the county has emergency sheltering plans/sites and points of dispensing plans/sites and also ensures the county has a plan for, and access to, the federal Strategic National Stockpile within 12 hours.

FINANCE

The **FINANCE DEPARTMENT** continues to implement and abide by North Carolina General Statutes. These requirements put in place internal controls, the pre-audit of expenditures as well as other processes that the Finance staff must follow.

Revenues – The County receives money from a variety of sources to provide services to citizens.

Local Governments rely on tax revenues for providing services to citizens. In Yadkin County over half of the total operating revenue comes from taxes. The two primary taxes that generate revenue are property tax and sales tax.

- **Property Tax** is the County's largest single source of revenue.
- **Sales Tax** (and other taxes) is the second largest source of revenue.
- **Intergovernmental** (Grants and restricted funds from Federal/State) is the third largest, followed by fees and miscellaneous revenues.

Expenses – The money that is expended to provide services.

The County incurs a number of expenses to provide quality services to our citizens. Two of the County's largest expenses are Education and Human Services. Education and Human Services expense make up around 50% of the County's expenses.

FY2024 FINANCE REVIEW

The FY2024 adopted budget for Yadkin County totaled **\$51,556,832**. The budget was an increase of \$7,951,549 from the FY2023 adopted budget. This increase is largely due to the new **GASB 87** and **GASB 96** requirements.

The construction of a new Government Facility Building started in FY2023 is planned to be complete in February 2025. This building will house Tax Collection, Tax Assessor, License Plate Agency and our Information Technology departments. This move will allow for a sallyport to be constructed at the existing court house, to safely transport inmates in and out of court.



HUMAN SERVICES AGENCY

The mission of the Yadkin County Human Services Agency is to protect and improve the health and quality of life of the citizens of Yadkin County. This is accomplished through the strengthening of families, promotion of self-sufficiency, eliminating poverty, assuring and maintaining healthy environments, education of the people, providing preventative health services and enforcing state rules and regulations.

THE HUMAN SERVICES AGENCY OF YADKIN COUNTY includes programs from Health and Social Services divisions. This agency is one of the larger County departments, with 85 positions and an annual budget of over 8 million dollars. Much of this budget is state and federal dollars.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES

Social Services administers federal and state entitlement programs. These include:

- Food & Nutrition Services
- Family & Children's Medicaid
- Adult Medicaid
- WorkFirst
- Subsidized Child Care
- Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP)
- Crisis Intervention Program (CIP)
- Child & Adult Protective Services
- Foster Care & Adoption Services
- Foster Home Recruitment
- Training & Licensing
- Adult Guardianship Services
- Adult Home Specialist Services
- Community Alternatives to Program for Disabled Adults (CAP-DA) Services
- Level I In-Home Aide Services
- Child Support Services

The **Medical Clinic** also includes a **Health Education program** and a **Care Manager for High Risk Children and Pregnant women**, both of which are grant-funded.

The Medical Clinic is proud to announce the addition of a part-time Provider to the clinical operations. This position has allowed for increased availability of clinical services for the residents of Yadkin County.

The Medical Clinic received NC Matters funding and training through UNC-Chapel Hill. This initiative focused on improving knowledge and comfort level for staff regarding mental health topics through trainings and one-on-one consultations.

The Medical Clinic also applied for and received a grant for dental health through Delta Dental. This initiative focuses on providing educational materials and resources to families regarding the importance of dental health during the early years. This agency is responsible for completing birth and death certificates for births and deaths that occur in Yadkin County.

FY2024 SOCIAL SERVICES HIGHLIGHTS

- **Medicaid Expansion:** This statewide initiative began in December 2023 and it enables more adults ages 19-64 to qualify for a full Medicaid program due to higher income limits. In Yadkin County, we have 1,740 citizens who have been enrolled in this program through August 2024.
- **Adult Services** staff have also been working with community partners to offer more services to adults who are struggling with mental health issues, stable housing concerns and other areas of their lives that are impacting their health and safety.

THE YADKIN COUNTY MEDICAL CLINIC

The **Medical Clinic** provides eligible clients in obstetric care visits, well-child visits and pediatric sick visits, communicable disease (CD) management, family planning services and vaccines. The Medical Clinic also includes a Health Education program and a Care Manager for high risk children and pregnant women, both of which are grant-funded. WIC is a supplemental nutrition education and breastfeeding support program for women, infants and children

that is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The Medical Clinic is proud to announce additional staff to our team: part-time CD nurse, Regional Hepatitis C Bridge Counselor, and Health Education Specialist. This past year, the Medical Clinic received state funding to improve blood pressure and glucose rates in pregnant women through targeted education and outreach. WIC and Care Management are sharing a full-time position. This partnership enabled our Care Manager to add a Community Health Worker and WIC to make the Breastfeeding Peer Counselor position full-time.

COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT

Every local health department in NC is required to conduct a quadrennial **Community Health Assessment** (CHA). The goal of this assessment is to survey Yadkin County residents to obtain a general overview of the health and well-being of the community. With community partners, the Agency completed the 2023 CHA. The complete report can be found on the Agency website.

VITAL RECORDS

The **Vital Records** unit is tasked with filing all home birth certificates and all in-county death certificates. Vital Records is also responsible for assisting citizens that wish to conduct what is known as a green burial. Green burials offer citizens an alternative to a traditional burial, as they avoid the use of embalming fluids, metal caskets and concrete vaults. A green burial would be used as a natural cycle of death and may be less expensive than the traditional burial. For questions regarding home birth certificates or death certificates, including green burials, please contact our main switchboard.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

There are two main program areas within Environmental Health

Food, Lodging and Institution (FLI)

On-Site Water Protection (OSWP)

The FLI section is responsible for the regulations, permitting and inspection of all of the food service facilities in the County, which includes all school cafeterias and nursing home food services. We inspect all:

- Lodging facilities
- Childcare centers
- School buildings
- Nursing homes
- Residential care facilities
- Local confinements
- Tattoo parlors
- Public swimming pools

The On-Site Water Protection section is responsible for protecting the environment and public health by regulating septic systems and private water wells. This past year, the team added three new staff, including the addition of a new position of Environmental Health Supervisor. These staff have been hard at work gaining state authorizations to complete this important work.

department is responsible for supplying and maintaining the county's information systems, cybersecurity, network, and all other digital needs. These systems are comprised of computers, servers, software, network wiring, switches, wireless, firewall, VPN, security video, and many network security related items that no one ever sees. In all, Yadkin County IT maintains over 3,800 actual devices at any given point in time.

In today's world we must diligently monitor the network for attacks of any type and be ready to respond accordingly to intercept and stop the attack. With Yadkin County continuing to grow and cyber threats becoming more prevalent, the need for updating security protocols across the network has increased. This means we must lead the way in security precautions/preventions and coordinate efforts with surrounding Counties. While Yadkin County may not be the largest county in the state, we still have the exact same types of data and equipment that even the largest counties have. This task requires the same caliber of safety measures and training to ensure a safe network environment for the community and employees.

We are a member of the MS-ISAC (Multi-State Information Sharing and Analysis Center) which is a round-the-clock cyber threat monitoring and mitigation center for state and local governments. Yadkin County's security posture has been significantly updated and is very vigilant against any suspicious activity. Network infrastructure is

monitored 24/7 to keep up with the ever-changing types and occurrences of attacks. Yadkin County continues to provide up to date monthly cybersecurity training and looks to expand trainings soon. We are continuing implementations for multifactor authentication across the board, which will help with preventing any unwanted access. During the last year, there was no loss of County information due to Malware or Ransomware.

Yadkin County is also PCI compliant, meaning Yadkin County meets the set of security standards designed to ensure that the information Yadkin County receives with regards to credit card transmittals is maintained on a secure environment. Our GIS website continues to be hosted on site by the IT Department and is maintained by the GIS Department. This allows for quicker updates on the website and a faster, more efficient way of providing geospatial data to the community. GIS has also added a new GIS Analyst position for future development of mapping applications throughout the County.

We are here to support all county departments with their IT resources and ensure a safe network environment. Whether it be through equipment and software or research and education, we strive to meet the department's needs efficiently and cost effectively.

NC COOPERATIVE EXTENSION

NC COOPERATIVE EXTENSION, is an educational partnership between **NC State University**, **NC A&T State University** and **Yadkin County**. Our mission is to help individuals, families, and communities put research-based knowledge to work for economic prosperity, environmental stewardship and an improved quality of life. 254 volunteers contributed 1,016 hours to help expand Extension outreach. Calculated at \$15 per hour that's a value of \$15,240. \$4,100 in outside fiscal resources were garnered for educational opportunities for county citizens.

Family and Consumer Science presented Serv Safe to food handlers in the county. This program instills correct food handling practices to restaurant workers, cafeteria staff and anyone who prepares food for the public. 60 participants were certified this year.

The 4-H Program had 1,493 direct youth contacts through special interest meetings and educational events offered. Activities have been done in conjunction with school systems, summer fun and with other Extension Agents and staff.

The Field Crop Program had 293 individual pesticide safety certifications that were issued or recertified this year. This amounts to 214,289 acres of crops that were treated correctly with pesticides to reduce unwanted plant pressure, insect control issues or protection from fungal agents. Additional training

was offered on Good Agricultural Production (GAP) to producers expanding their operations. Over 300 acres of tobacco were GAP grown and this leads to better marketing opportunities.

The Horticulture

Program encompasses everything from commercial crop production to homeowner requests for information and is recognized for excellence in the region. The program also maintains the "Visit NC Farms" app for smart phones. This app promotes Yadkin County agricultural operations to the general public and is recognized as one of the most successful county programs in the state.

The Livestock Program manages the county Ag Awareness Day and works with individual producers in the county on livestock management processes. Local Livestock Association meetings are being conducted on a regular basis. This group serves as a leading voice for livestock production in this region of the state and includes producers from Yadkin and Davie counties.

YADKIN COUNTY PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT operates 7 different locations for the public to enjoy throughout the year. These include Yadkin Memorial Park at Lake Hampton, Yadkin County Park, Styers Mill Park, Richmond Hill, Shores River Access, Donnaha River Access, and Huntsville River Access. Parks and Recreation also serves as the county landscape maintenance for all county-owned properties. This encompasses 29 sites and over 900 acres. Below is an overview of all that Yadkin County Parks and Recreation has to offer and updates on current projects.

YADKIN MEMORIAL PARK

Yadkin Memorial Park sits on Lake Hampton and is the county’s newest park. It opened in November 2014 and has steadily become a popular spot for kayakers, walkers, bird watchers, and overall nature lovers. Fishermen also enjoy the quiet lake setting as they come to catch a variety of stocked fish including crappie, bass, and catfish. As a convenient “one-stop shop”, the office at Lake Hampton carries a variety of bait, ice, disc golf discs, snacks, and drinks. The employees are also registered to sell hunting/fishing licenses and register your boat. While personal kayaks, trolling motor-powered boats, paddle boats, and stand-up paddle boards are all welcome on Lake Hampton, gas-powered boats are not permitted. If you do not have access to a personal boat, the county does offer a variety of kayaks and jon boats for rent by the hour or the day.

This year, Yadkin Memorial Park again offered an opportunity for duck hunting through a lottery system. By closing on specific days throughout the fall and winter, Lake Hampton provided the lottery winners with a great location to hunt.

The other amenities at Lake Hampton include 3 picnic pavilions (which can be rented for events), a paved walking trail, a playground with swings,

picnic tables, charcoal grills, 2 fishing piers, and a boat launch. The facilities also include a universally accessible kayak launch. With step-by-step instructions, this kayak launch allows almost anyone to enjoy a day on the water, no matter their physical

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limitations. The walking trails through the woods on the west side of Lake Hampton are complete and new signs have been placed to guide you through the scenic woods close to Lake Hampton. These trails are approximately 1.75 miles long. Our newest trail on the southeast side of Lake Hampton makes its way behind the Hood-Chamberlin dam and across a new 86 ft long pedestrian bridge over South Deep Creek. This trail is approximately 3 miles long.

In September 2020, Yadkin Memorial Park opened several new additions. These additions were able to happen in large part of a PARTF grant awarded to the county in 2017. A new entrance was added at 2513 Ireland Road Yadkinville, NC 27055 that leads to the 18-hole George Sappenfield Disc Golf Course and entrance to the Ashley Ladd Trail. At the main Memorial Park entrance, a new dog park can accommodate small and large dogs and has agility equipment to fit all ability levels. Primitive camping has also been added, with 7 campsites that include a fire ring, lantern holder, and picnic table at each site.

YADKIN COUNTY PARK

Yadkin County Park is located near the YMCA and is home to an outdoor pool (seasonally), a large pavilion, three small shelters, a walking/jogging trail, a nature trail, an amphitheater, a fishing pier, a large playground, three baseball/softball fields, six soccer fields, a disc golf course, an outdoor volleyball court, a veterans memorial, and a dog park for large and small

dogs. The park is conveniently open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. all year. The shelter facility can provide the perfect space for a birthday party or celebration with an indoor room attached that includes bathrooms and a kitchen.

The County Park also hosts several events throughout the year. These events include Yadkin Soccer Association soccer tournaments and local Recreation leagues, Yadkin County girls' softball tournament, Yadkin County boys' baseball tournament, Memorial Day and Veterans Day services at the Veterans Memorial, two professional disc golf events, environmental field days, and swim lessons at the county pool.

RICHMOND HILL

The picnic pavilions and park area near Richmond Hill are maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department and are located within the 30-acre Richmond Hill Law School and Nature Park. Staff has restored the trails that circle the park and they are now a great place to get away for a nice walk. Three signs with a map of the trails are posted around the park at the Law School building and at both shelters. To reserve the shelters at Richmond Hill Park please call the Parks and Recreation Office. RIVER ACCESSSES

Yadkin County also maintains 3 river access locations along the Yadkin River intended to give the public easily available areas to go fishing or launch a boat. Enjoy the scenic views of the Yadkin River by taking advantage of these access points. These accesses are a part of the Yadkin River State Trail.

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CURRENT PROJECTS

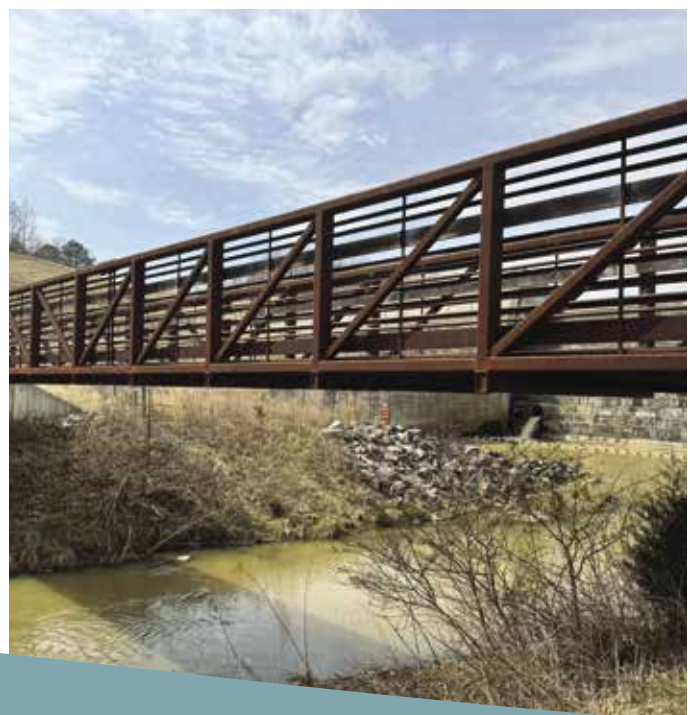
Parks and Recreation staff is very excited to continue to build new facilities and create new opportunities for Yadkin County citizens. We hope you find something that currently benefits you and your family and that you are also thrilled about things to come with the list of projects below.

- Parks & Recreation is currently working with Benesch out of Charlotte to update the **County's 10-year master plan as well as master plans for the Yadkin County Park and Yadkin Memorial Park**. These plans will guide us throughout the next ten years as we continue to grow. Benesch has completed a random survey of County residents and will be continuing to work on the plan. If you were randomly selected to participate and did so, thank you for your time and input. When the plan is completed and adopted by the

Board of County Commissioners it will be placed on the County website to view.

- The **Donnaha Yadkin River** access has reopened to the public after being closed for two years due to construction of the Hwy 67 bridge over the Yadkin River. This site is a heavily used river access and we are glad to have it back open to the public for use.
- Parks & Recreation is dedicated to continue to provide better quality recreation and facilities. This past year the department acquired an **irrigation system** to assist in the maintenance of our ball fields at the Yadkin County Park. This system has already made an impact on the quality of turf at the park due to its use during drought conditions in June of 2024.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

The **PUBLIC BUILDINGS DEPARTMENT** is responsible for the overall maintenance of all Public Buildings owned by Yadkin County. Yadkin County owns approximately 51 buildings and is currently responsible for the maintenance of approximately 250,000 square feet of floor space. During FY2024, the Public Buildings Department had processed 892 work orders up 98 work orders from the previous year. The Public Buildings Department also has 6 automobiles and 5 pool vehicles that are maintained with Yadkin County's vehicle fleet. The Public Building Department is also responsible for cleaning 13 buildings within the County and maintains approximately 195 HVAC units for our buildings.

REGISTER OF DEEDS

By law, the **REGISTER OF DEEDS** serves as custodian and manager of large volumes of public records for the County. The Register of Deeds is legally charged with the integrity, completeness, accuracy and safekeeping of these public records. This amounts to approximately 6,000 documents and plats recorded and 275 marriage licenses issued each year. The documents recorded include:

- Deeds
- Deeds of Trust
- Powers of Attorneys
- Separation Agreements
- Plats
- Deed of Trust
- Satisfactions
- Military Discharges
- Various agreements

The office also records and issues certified copies of birth, death and marriage records and issues notary public oaths and maintains a listing of all notaries who reside in the County.

The annual revenue collected is approximately \$500,000 for these various recordings and services.

We use the most current technology to ensure easy access and retrieval of all our records and provide a courteous and professional environment. In October 2015 e-recording was implemented which allows out of town attorneys and lending institutions to electronically file documents in a more efficient and timely manner. In April 2017, Electronic Birth Registration System (EBRS), a program administered through the Department of N. C. Vital Records, was implemented which allows customers who were born in 1971 and later to acquire a certified birth certificate if they were born in another North Carolina county. Get Certificate Now, an online vital records application, has been implemented which allows a customer to order vital records and pay for

them online. A fraud detection notification service called "Property Notification" was implemented in 2020 which sends an email notification when a document is recorded in the Register of Deeds office that matches someone's name who has signed up for the service. There is no charge for this service. In August 2020 an online marriage application was implemented which allows a couple applying for a marriage license to submit their information online to streamline the marriage license issuance process.

Every day registry employees work tirelessly to ensure that the documents we record reflect the trust that our patrons place in us. This commitment to excellence is the very foundation of our service. Please don't hesitate to contact this office, if we can assist you in any way.

SOIL & WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

The **YADKIN SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT** (Yadkin SWCD) operates under the guidance of the Yadkin Soil and Water Conservation District Board. The Yadkin SWCD works with landowners to provide technical and financial assistance to improve water quality and minimize soil erosion. We also maintain and operate 14 flood control structures (dams) within Yadkin County, including the Hood/Chamberlain (5D) Reservoir.

In 2024, there were 32 conservation plans written covering 3264 acres for practices that support the Farm Bill and other federal and state programs. Conservation practices in these plans include:

- Crop-based rotations
- Animal waste management
- Livestock exclusions
- Grassed waterways
- Field borders
- Other practices.

We also offer available for rent through our office:

- Two 10ft wide John Deere Drills
- One 7ft wide Haybuster drill

During 2024 these drills were utilized by 22 farmers for use on 1246 acres of cropland.

SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT

The **YADKIN COUNTY SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT** operates 7 convenience sites and 1 Transfer Station within the County. Our convenience sites are strategically located across the County to serve almost 13,000 unincorporated households. Convenience sites only accept bagged household trash and single-stream recyclables. For all other materials not accepted at the convenience sites, the Transfer Station at the Yadkin County Solid Waste Facility, is available to all residents and businesses. The Solid Waste Facility accepts bagged trash, recyclables, construction and demolition debris, yard waste, metal, tires, electronics and motor oil.

Yadkin County residents are required to show their Solid Waste sticker at all sites in order to deposit waste and recyclables at convenience sites and the Transfer Station. The sticker covers the cost of waste generated within the household. All other waste must be deposited in the Transfer Station for a charge of \$73.00 per ton with an \$10.00 minimum. Examples of waste not covered under the Solid Waste Sticker include, but are not limited to, construction/demolition debris, renovation debris, furniture, burned waste, or commercially generated waste.

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RECYCLE RIGHT NC

Within the past few years, the cost of recycling has increased drastically across the country. Counties and municipalities across North Carolina, including Yadkin County, have experienced the significant increase in the cost of recycling. One of the leading causes for the increase in costs is contaminants (garbage) within the recycle stream.

To assist governments, recycling companies, and citizens, the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality launched the **Recycle Right NC Campaign**. This campaign is aimed at educating the public about types of materials that can be recycled and about removing garbage/contaminates from the recycling stream. By reducing the volume of garbage mixed into recyclables, the recycling process can become more effective and efficient. TAX OFFICE: ASSESSORS & COLLECTORS

The **YADKIN COUNTY TAX OFFICE** is comprised of both the **Assessor's** and **Collector's** Offices.

The **Assessor's Office** is responsible for the listing, appraisal and assessment of all taxable property in Yadkin County and to furnish tax base figures to the County for budget purposes. The Tax Office completed the county wide reappraisal for FY2023. The county's tax base of Real and Personal Property increased to \$3,464,096,868 and continues to see growth through new construction in both the residential and commercial markets. The County's tax rate was reduced to \$.65 per \$100.00 valuation. The tax office is continuing to seek new and innovative ways to serve the citizens of Yadkin County better. The office is working with our software and the county's GIS department to develop better tools to increase the amount of information and to create a more user-friendly environment for our web applications.

The **Collector's Office** is responsible for the collection of all current and delinquent property taxes due to Yadkin County as well as the towns of Boonville and East Bend. In FY2023 we maintained a collection rate above 98%. The collections office uses a variety of collection remedies in accordance with the NC General Statutes to collect these taxes. One of the remedies that we use is the NC Local Government Debt Setoff Clearinghouse program. This program allows collections of delinquent debts by off-setting debtors NC State Tax Refunds and Education Lottery Winnings. In FY2023 we received a total of \$66,813, and in all years participating we have received approximately \$1.529 million dollars in funds. Be on the lookout for different billing options in 2025. Yadkin County will still continue to mail paper bills however, you will have the option to receive your annual tax bill by email and/or text if you so choose. This will be more efficient for those of you that like to have everything at your fingertips.

LICENSE PLATE AGENCY

The Tax Office also has the contract with the NC Department of Transportation to operate the License Plate Agency (LPA) in Yadkin County. The LPA office added a third clerk this year to accommodate the high volume of transactions that it receives and also to help cut down on wait times to serve the public better. The Yadkin County LPA Office once again was recognized by the NCDOT as being one of the top two performing offices in the state making the least amount of errors.

STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

The property tax in North Carolina is governed by Sub Chapter 11 of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes of North Carolina. Local Boards of Commissioners have very little discretion in property taxes due to these statutes (also known as the Machinery Act) being State Law rather than local ordinances. The Machinery Act guarantees all 100 North Carolina Counties will administer the property tax laws under the same guidelines with a minimum of local discretion. The County Board of Commissioners has the responsibility of setting the county tax rate.

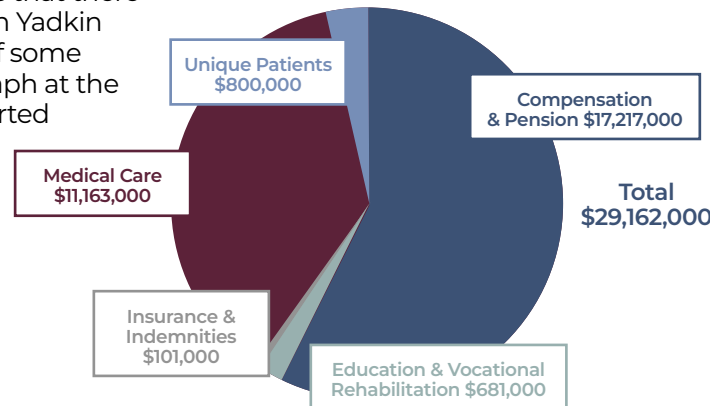

WATER & SEWER

The **YADKIN COUNTY WATER & SEWER DEPARTMENT** maintains the Highway 21 Waterline and the East Bend Waterline. County staff respond to any issue and manage the daily operations and maintenance of both lines. The County owns a waterline and sewer line along US Hwy 601 that is leased to the Town of Yadkinville for operations and maintenance.

Yadkin County purchases water from the Town of Jonesville to operate the Highway 21 Waterline. The waterline extends along Highway 21 from Jonesville south to Lydall (near the I-77 and US 421 intersection). Yadkin County purchases water from the Winston Salem/Forsyth County Utilities Commission to operate the East Bend Waterline, some of which is then resold to the Town of East Bend. The waterline runs along Taylor Road, a portion of Old US Highway 421, and on Flint Hill Road to the Town of East Bend.

Yadkin County Water and Sewer employees work diligently to ensure the efficient operation and maintenance of the Highway 21 waterline and the East Bend waterline. In addition to the daily monitoring and maintenance, employees assist municipal water departments if requested, perform NC811 utility locates across the County and assist with Environmental Health permitting for residents and businesses when needed. Last year the County added four new customers on the Hwy 21 line and two new customers on the East Bend line. In addition, billing operations for the Hwy 21 line, previously performed by the Town of Jonesville, were moved to the Yadkin County Finance Department for an estimated 2 percent cost savings.

Water and Sewer lines are considered **enterprise funds** which require that operations be funded by fees collected. Tax dollars are not used to fund water and sewer operations.

ECONOMIC / TOURISM DEVELOPMENT

ECONOMIC & TOURISM DEVELOPMENT IN YADKIN COUNTY welcomed a number of new businesses during the year ending June 30, 2024, and held ribbon cuttings for **Aesthetix Laser & Med Spa**, **Farm School on Wheels**, **Little Heaven B&B**, and **Kraken Collectables**.

Economic Development staff worked to promote Dream It / Do It, a program to show all Yadkin 8th grade students local career opportunities, and participated in local Job Fairs. The unemployment rate in Yadkin remains one of the lowest in Northwest North Carolina. Staff also is working on a new Childcare Initiative to create new job opportunities and remove barriers for parents to return to the workforce, completed the 2023-2024 Leadership Yadkin County class, and promoted the designation of US421 from Winston-Salem to Wilkes County as Interstate I-777.

Domestic Tourism in Yadkin County generated an economic impact of \$52.46 million in 2023, an increase of 3.4% from the prior year. Total payroll generated by the tourism industry in Yadkin County was \$14.60 million, and \$1.5 million in local taxes were generated from sales and property tax revenue from travel related businesses. Each Yadkin County household saved on average \$95.06 in state and local taxes due to visitor spending. Travel and tourism industry directly provides more than 394 full-time jobs. In the last fiscal year, **Yadkin County Tourism Development Authority** (YC-TDA) collected \$66,000, an increase of 33% from the previous year.

The YC-TDA continues to promote our area through print and digital marketing, social media, tourism websites, newsletters & itineraries, brochures, travel shows, engaging with bloggers / travel writers, and content creation. Visitors to Yadkin County can indulge in award-winning wines, outdoor activities including hiking, biking and fishing, arts events, festivals, rodeo events, historical sites, barn quilt trail and our local farmers market. Our visitors have diverse lodging options to choose from in Yadkin County, including the recent opening of our new bed and breakfast Little Heaven B&B, cabins, RV Parks, campgrounds, hotels/motels, and lodging choices listed on Airbnb & VRBO.

LIBRARIES

Four Yadkin County Public Libraries are located in Boonville, East Bend, Jonesville, and Yadkinville. They are all branches of the **NORTHWESTERN REGIONAL LIBRARY** that includes 13 branches in Alleghany, Stokes, Surry and Yadkin counties. The mission of all the libraries is to advance knowledge, strengthen communities, and inspire people.

Rebranding of all libraries including new outside signage for all libraries has been installed to help identify each library. New logos, signage, and more were developed to let people know that there are many free services, and something for everyone. The libraries are part of NC Cardinal resource sharing with access to over 9 million books, audios, and DVDs at no charge to users. Other e-resources include NCLive databases and NCKids Digital as well as Hoopla streaming and NewsBank (access to local, state and national newspapers). Other services included public, computers, Wi-Fi, hotspots and chrome books for check out, VITA- free tax assistance, test proctoring, job/resume assistance, technology training, book clubs, and Summer Learning Programs for all ages. More information is available at our new website at NRWL.org.

Story walks that combine literacy and outside exercise are located in all four communities at parks and libraries through a generous grant from the Shallowford Foundation.

Libraries continue to strengthen communities through partnerships. The Yadkin County Public Libraries partner with many community agencies and organizations such as schools, senior centers, and civic groups. Library Friends Groups across the county support the libraries through fundraising and special projects. All four public libraries were agencies of the Yadkin County United Fund. **We're here for YOU.**

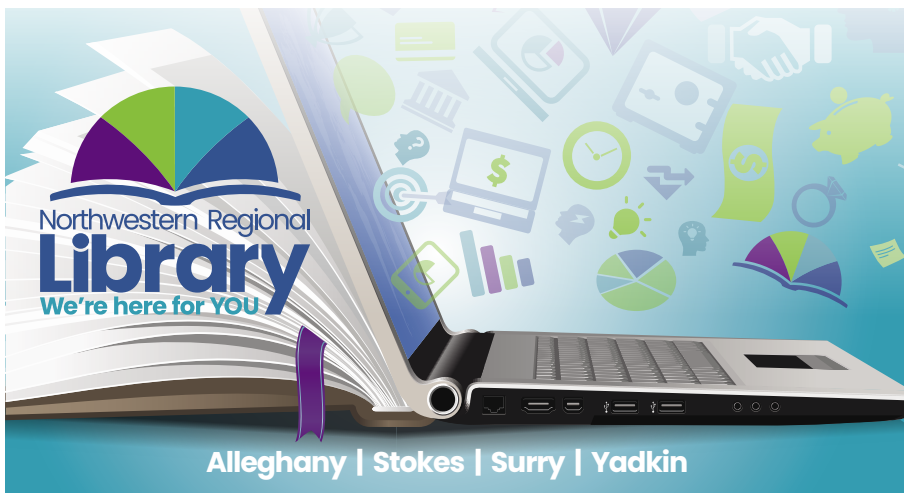

YADKIN CENTER OF SURRY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

THE YADKIN CENTER OF SURRY COMMUNITY COLLEGE is helping students reach their career goals in Welding, Computer-Integrated Machining, Mechatronics, Physical Therapy, Fire Protection, Emergency Medical, and Truck Driver Training. Students can also earn an Associate in Arts college transfer degree without having to leave the center in Yadkinville. **The Yadkin Early College High School** is a fundamental and vibrant part of The Yadkin Center. These students have the option of conveniently completing degrees and credentials while still in high school, tuition free.

The Yadkin Early College High School Class of 2024 boasted 54 graduates who completed 62 associate degrees. The associate degrees by category are as follows: Associate in Arts, 32 degrees, and Associate in Science, 16 degrees, with nine students completing both the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees. Other degrees awarded included three Associate in Applied Science degrees, one Associate in Fine Arts in Visual Arts degree, and one Associate in Science Teacher Preparation (ATSP).

Surry Community College's Academic Support Services help students be successful through tutoring sessions – in-person, online or through group support. Since 2014, Surry Community College has partnered with Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute to offer Truck Driver Training, which prepares students to sit for the Commercial Driver's License (CDL) exam. Six classes were offered in the last academic year resulting in 2,304 contact hours. The program has graduated 420 students since its implementation. Last year, 74 students graduated from the program with 57 already being employed by graduation. The Golden Leaf Foundation provided \$200,000 in funding, supplying two automatic range trucks and one range trailer and one road trailer.

Healthcare programs are a top priority at The Yadkin Center. A new **Clinical Medical Assistant** program was implemented in Spring 2024. The course prepares students for a broad range of skills that make medical assistants versatile and valuable to any healthcare team. Students learn skills to perform duties in both clinical and doctor office settings. In Spring 2024, nine students completed class requirements. Eight of the nine sat for the National Health career Association (NHA) exam, and 100 percent were successful. Clinical Medical Assistant is

also being offered in Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 at The Yadkin Center. Additionally, the Physical Therapist Assistant program (PTA), Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) classes, Central Sterile Processing courses and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) are offered at The Yadkin Center. Seventeen PTA classes were held last year resulting in 1,616 contact hours. Two CNA classes and one Central Sterile Processing class were offered, resulting in 536 contact hours. Yadkin Center students took 42 EMS classes creating 919 contact hours.

The Firefighter and Technical Rescue program at The Yadkin Center now features a new 40-foot contained trailer called the Firefighter Confidence and Rescue Prop. It will be used to teach several certification and non-certification class skills including forcible entry, rescue, mayday, ventilation, search, and confined space among several others. The unit will also benefit high school students taking classes through the Career & College Promise program. Last year, 15 fire science classes were offered resulting in 665.5 contact hours. Eleven Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET) classes were offered including the sought after Lt. Kirk Hensley class Surviving the First Three Seconds. BLET courses resulted in 1,174 contact hours. The N.C. State Highway Patrol also had training at the Yadkin Center with 75 students per class in the spring and fall. A self-defense class enrolled 21 students from

public safety, healthcare and educational fields. Notary classes are also going strong at The Yadkin Center with 17 classes offered resulting in 136 contact hours.

Interest in the Computer-Integrated Machining program at The Yadkin Center has increased with one class being offered in Spring 2024 and two classes in Fall 2024. Leadership Yadkin involved 23 participants who graduated in April 2024 and toured many private and public entities in Yadkin County. Yadkin Center students can complete a degree, a diploma and a certificate in Mechatronics; a diploma and a certificate in Welding; and a degree, diploma and a certificate in Computer-Integrated Machining. Yadkin Center students can also complete a two-year Associate in Arts, a college transfer degree that leads to a bachelor's degree at a four-year college or university with all classes offered at The Yadkin Center.

The Yadkin County Commissioners approved the **Yadkin Guarantee** initiative in 2018 ensuring that recent Yadkin County high school graduates could attend the Yadkin Center with tuition and book expenses paid by Yadkin County. The Yadkin Guarantee monies fill in the difference where scholarships and

federal financial aid stops. The Yadkin Guarantee benefited 47 students with tuition/fees assistance during the 2023-24 academic year.

The Yadkin Center provides high school juniors and seniors a way to earn college credits, tuition free, while still in a traditional high school through the Career & College Promise program. Students at Forbush High School and Starmount High School can attend classes at The Yadkin Center during their regular high school schedule. Students who attend homeschool or private schools can participate in the Career & College Promise program as well. The Yadkin Center also offers customized industry training for Yadkin County businesses and is available at The Yadkin Center along with many locations throughout Yadkin County. A variety of other training opportunities are offered at The Yadkin Center including Law Enforcement, Basic Skills, High School Equivalency, and English as a Second Language (ESL).

YADKIN COUNTY OPIOID RESPONSE

Since 2021, the North Carolina Attorney General has announced \$56 billion in national settlements with opioid companies that will help bring desperately needed resources to communities harmed by the opioid epidemic, including \$1.5 billion to North Carolina. The agreements resolve litigation over the role of companies in creating and fueling the opioid epidemic. The agreements also require significant industry changes that will help prevent this type of crisis from ever happening again.

A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the State and local government directs how opioid settlement funds are distributed and used in our state. To maximize funds flowing to North Carolina communities on the front lines of the opioid epidemic, the MOA allocates 15 percent of settlement funds to the State and sends the remaining 85 percent to NC's 100 counties and 17 municipalities.

THE YADKIN COUNTY OPIOID SETTLEMENT COMMITTEE is made up of local officials and stakeholders and focuses on identified high impact abatement strategies listed in the Memorandum of Agreement. The Yadkin County Board of Commissioners have passed two Spending Authorizations for the use of settlement funds to address the needs of its citizens in response to the Opioid Epidemic. These funds have been used to staff two fulltime positions dedicated to supporting the initiatives of the Committee.

The Opioid Action Coordinator focuses on Recovery Support Services and works with service providers in making resources available to citizens. Citizens in need of assistance may be referred to the appropriate agencies for help.

The Mobile Integrated Healthcare Paramedic, formerly Community Paramedic, is a fully licensed paramedicine provider focusing on Post Overdose Response and follow up.

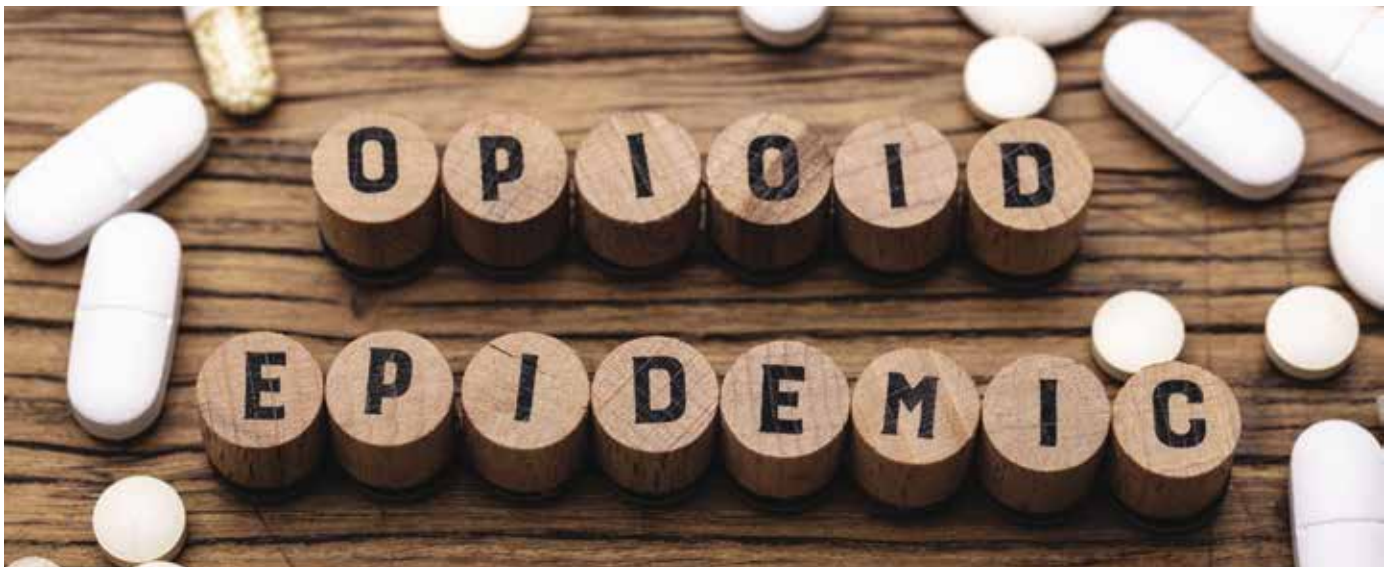
Both positions provide public education on opioid matters and distribute harm reduction materials when available.

Last year, these positions:

- Distributed 532 Harm Reduction Kits
- Administered Naloxone 35 times
- Followed up with 49 patients in need of treatment.
